# Apartheid Museum

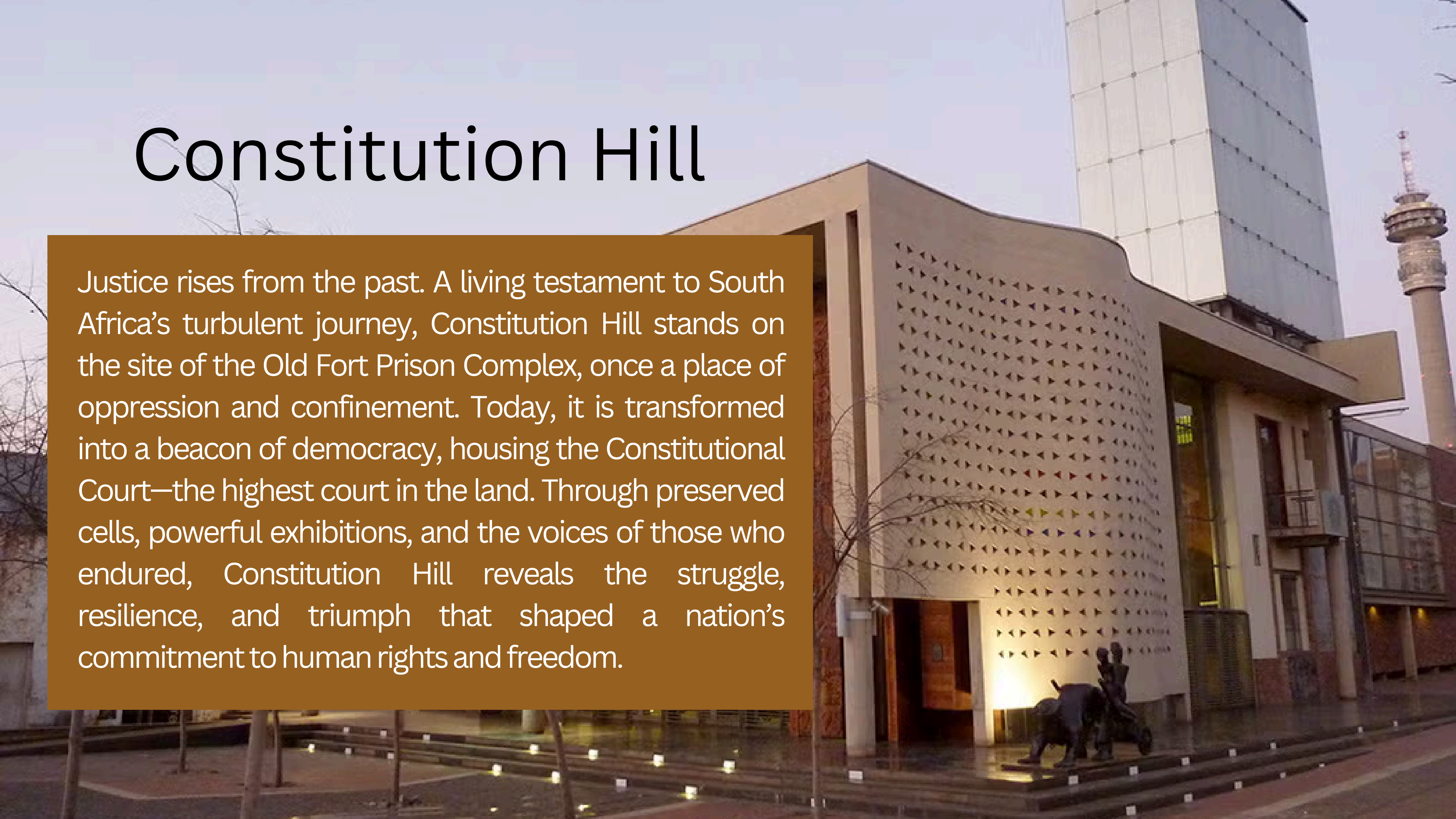


# Workers' Museum

# Constitution Hill

Justice rises from the past. A living testament to South Africa's turbulent journey, Constitution Hill stands on the site of the Old Fort Prison Complex, once a place of oppression and confinement. Today, it is transformed into a beacon of democracy, housing the Constitutional Court—the highest court in the land. Through preserved cells, powerful exhibitions, and the voices of those who endured, Constitution Hill reveals the struggle, resilience, and triumph that shaped a nation's commitment to human rights and freedom.



# Walter Sisulu Square of Dedication

**Where voices rose for freedom, the echoes still sing.** In the heart of Kliptown, Soweto, stands Walter Sisulu Square of Dedication—a living monument to South Africa’s democratic journey. It was here, on 26 June 1955, that thousands gathered for the historic Congress of the People to adopt the Freedom Charter, a bold vision of equality, liberty, and human rights. Today, the square embodies those ideals in its design and spirit, serving as both a cultural landmark and a place of reflection on the nation’s path from struggle to freedom



# The Mandela House

Walk Through the Legacy of Freedom where Nelson Mandela lived from 1946 until his imprisonment in 1962, and briefly after his release in 1990. Preserved as the Nelson Mandela National Museum, it holds original furnishings and artifacts that reflect his life and struggle. The street itself is remarkable, once home to both Mandela and Archbishop Desmond Tutu, two Nobel Peace Prize laureates whose presence shaped Soweto's history.



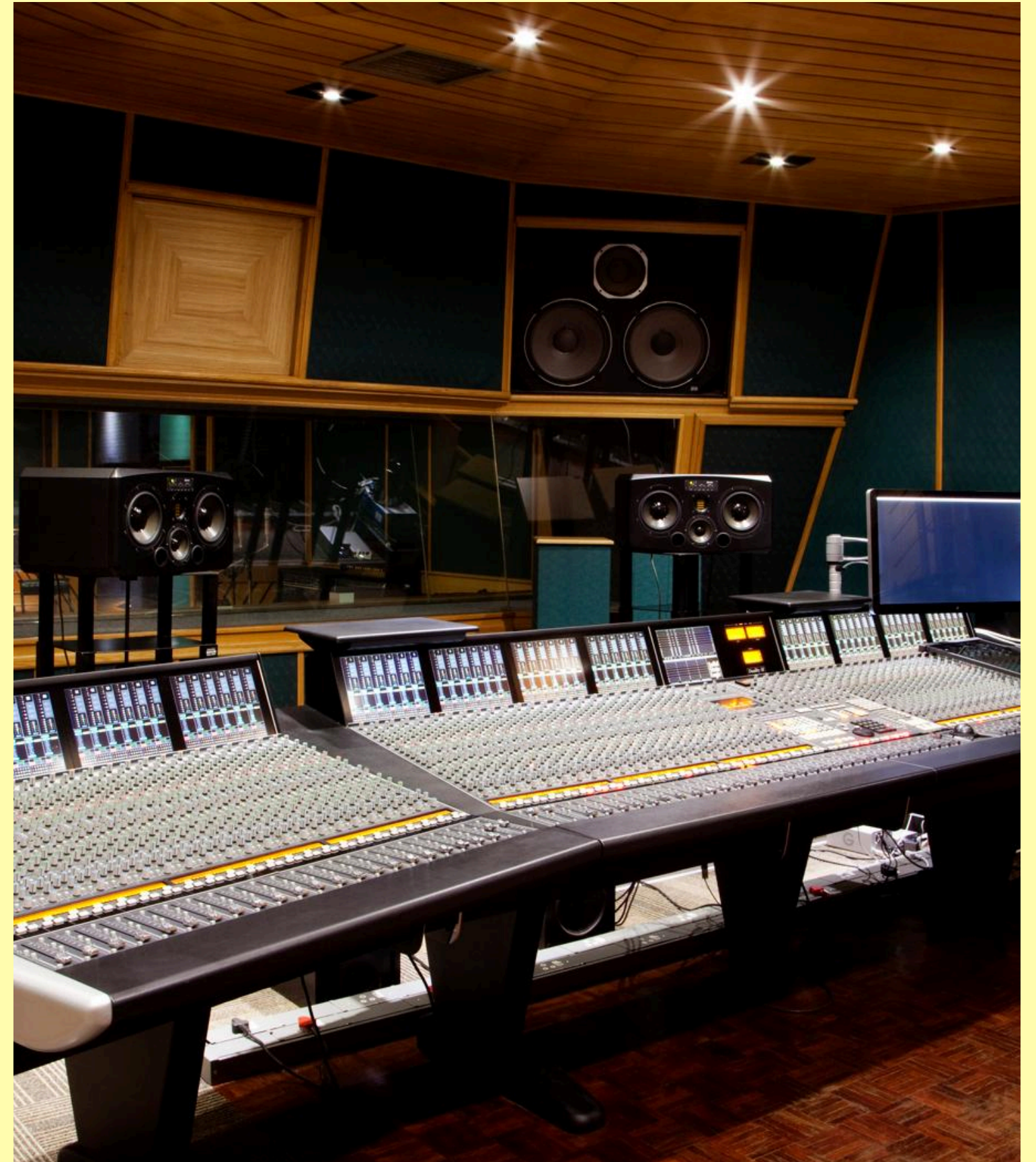
# Regina Mundi Church

Regina Mundi, the largest Roman Catholic church in South Africa, located in Soweto. Completed in 1962, it became known as the People's Cathedral for its pivotal role during the anti-apartheid struggle. When political gatherings were banned, the church opened its doors to activists, offering refuge and a place for voices of resistance. Even today, bullet holes and damaged pews remain as solemn reminders of the clashes that once shook its walls.



# Downtown Music Hub

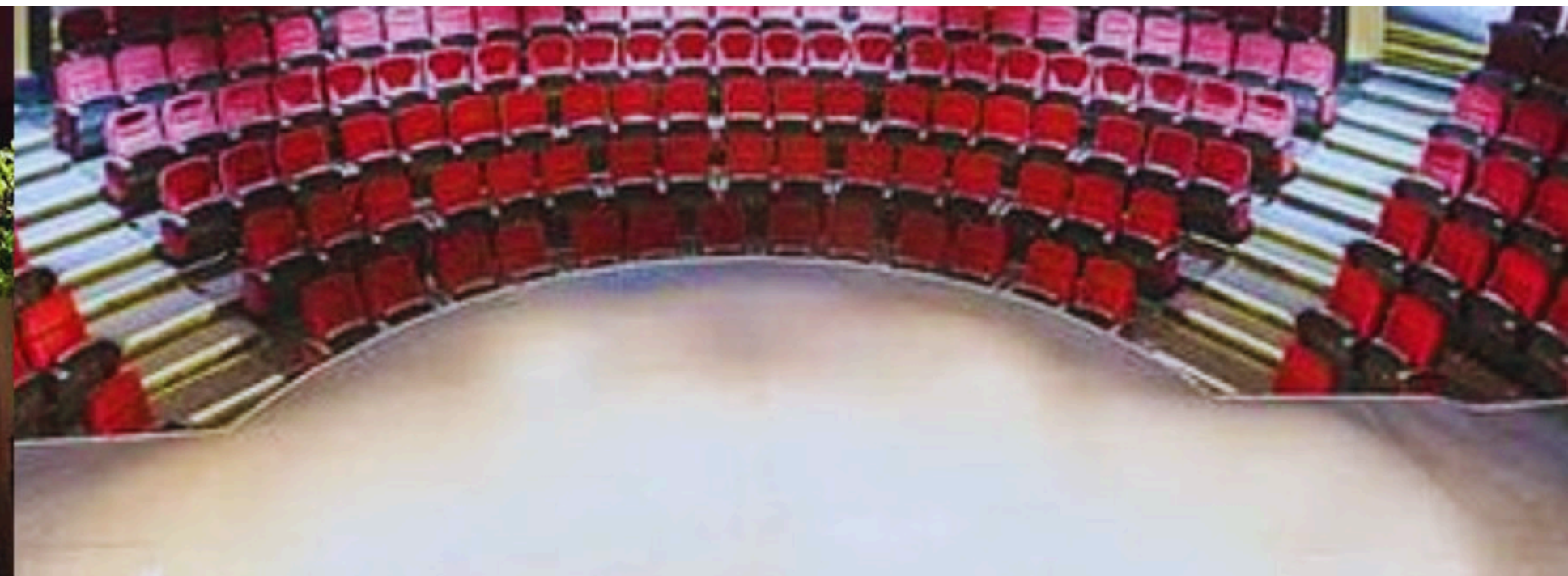

# Basotho Cultural

## Village

# BaKoena ba Mopeli Royal House

Royal lineage meets living tradition.  
The BaKoena ba Mopeli clan trace their heritage to Paulus Mopeli, brother of King Moshoeshe I of Lesotho. Today, King Moremoholo Motebang Mopeli leads 43 chiefs, embodying ancestral authority.



# Sterkfontein Dam

Where earth meets sky, and still waters whisper eternity - Sterkfontein Dam rises with quiet grandeur, its wall the second highest in South Africa and the nation's tallest earth-fill marvel. From the winding R74, the reservoir unfurls in sweeping vistas—an invitation to pause, breathe deeply, and let the scenery wash over you.

Our journey reaches its peak in KwaZulu-Natal, where natural beauty and deep-rooted history converge along the iconic R74. Set in the Maloti-Drakensberg UNESCO World Heritage Site, it offers an authentic rural experience — from meeting friendly locals and browsing a lively marketplace to enjoying a tractor-trailer ride up Mngxoleni Mountain. Guests can try traditional weaving, take a scenic village walk, and stop by the local tavern for homebrew and hearty homemade food.



# MGHWABANE SAN ROCK ART TRAIL

---

A short, scenic walk in Busingatha leads you to Mghwabane Shelter, an ancient San rock art site alive with sacred eland, bees, honeycombs, and mythic figures. Named after the legendary water serpent uMghwabane, the shelter offers a rare glimpse into the spiritual world of early hunter-gatherers. Still protected by the AmaZizi community today, this accessible trail pairs perfectly with an EmaZizini homestead visit for an authentic blend of culture, landscape, and living heritage.

# Cathedral Peak Wine Estate



Mountains pour their spirit into the vine at the Cathedral Peak Wine Estate, the only wine land in KwaZulu-Natal. Surrounded by the dramatic peaks of Cathedral, Cathkin, and Champagne Castle, the estate offers visitors a chance to taste wines shaped by this unique landscape. Each glass reflects a philosophy of sustainability and authenticity, connecting travellers to the land's heritage while enjoying breathtaking views and a true sense of place.

# KwaZulu Weavers

Threads carry the stories of people through hand-spinning, natural dyeing, and intricate patterns, KwaZulu Weavers celebrates the creativity and cultural significance of textiles that continue to inspire across generations.



# Chocolate Memories

# Gandhi's Phoenix Settlement



Gandhi's Phoenix Settlement - where quiet courage was printed, lived, and set free. Founded in 1903, the settlement was the birthplace of satyagraha—a bold experiment in self-reliant communal living where ethical labour, justice, and human dignity shaped Mahatma Gandhi's philosophy of non-violent resistance. Serving as the intellectual home of his South African activism, it housed the Indian Opinion press. Today it stands as a living heritage site of resilience, peaceful resistance, and shared humanity.
